The one described above will be presented Friday evening, December 13 after our 6:30pm service. Then on Saturday, December 14<sup>th</sup> as part of our Morning Minyan, Ms. Franklin will be addressing her explorations in Jewish Genealogy as past president of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies.
