From Where I Stand

We are far enough into the 21st century that we can refer to the 20th century American – Jewish experience as "History." There may indeed be more courses that I teach as your 'emeritus,' but my last course as the active rabbi will deal with the uniqueness and hopes of 20th century America to refashion the role of the Jew in the Diaspora.

Like all Jewish communities past and present, we have been impacted by the Holocaust, Zionism, and the State of Israel. However, in these 9 one-hour sessions we will be reading and discussing the phenomena and institutions that have made American Jewry one-of-a-kind, an antidote to the dynamics of exile in Europe.

The course will examine the huge impact of Jewish immigration at the beginning of the century and how it led to the whole array of political and social welfare institutions we have today. We'll look at the origins of the different ideologies and denominations in synagogue life, and discuss the impetus and the pros and cons of the secular Jewish option as well. Israel and Zionism have given American Jewry a great sense of pride and a creative tension as well. The history of the holocaust has imbued us with a sense of vigilance to the point that the U.S. Holocaust Museum sits prominently at the center of our nation's capital.

What this all means for ourselves and for generations to come is ripe material for speculation, and should yield good discussion and learning. (We'll begin on Thursday evening, February 13th at 7 pm.)

Reflections...

As I sit down to write my article this month, my mind keeps drifting back to the Reform movement's biennial in San Diego, where I just spent Shabbat this past weekend. I had never attended biennial before, but I have been hearing for years how incredible and impactful it is. I have been to many Jewish conferences, so I thought I was prepared for the experience I would have there. I wasn't.

On Shabbat morning, 5000 Jews gathered together in a giant room at the convention center to pray and learn together. I wasn't sure how I would feel about services that were projected onto enormous screens throughout the room—

how deeply could you really feel a service if you were so far away from the bima? But what I found was that the service leaders— Rabbi Rick Jacobs and Cantor/Rabbi Angela Buchdahl—did an extraordinary job of making the service accessible and even intimate, despite the size of the room and number of people who were there. There were many moments that moved me deeply and many melodies that I have been humming for days - be prepared for some new melodies at services in the coming weeks! However, what I want to describe is something that Rabbi Jacobs did that I've never seen before and that really transformed one part of the liturgy for me.

Before we chant the shema on Shabbat morning, it is traditional to gather the four corners of your tallit—the four tsitsit—into your hand, as you say the words "gather us from the four corners of the earth." You then hold the tsitsit over your eyes as you recite the shema. I have always loved this embodiment of the text and felt very connected to this piece of liturgical choreography. But instead of just gathering my fringes as I always do, Rabbi Jacobs had us all—all 5000 people—hold out our hands and place each fringe into our palm, keeping in mind different communities around the world that need to be held right now. Syria, the Philippines, one whole fringe for Newtown. He urged us to think beyond the four corners of our Jewish world and instead to gather into our hearts and our prayers ALL of the people of the world who need hope and prayer right now. The Shema has never felt as powerful to me as it did that morning.

Congregation B'nai Tikvah is a Reform congregation which, through personal attention, provides to its members an extended family. The congregation fulfills its members' spiritual needs, fosters their Jewish identity, promotes the perpetuation of Judaism and its members' Jewish education, and encourages a commitment to full participation in Temple life.

How many of you have heard of the organization in the SF Bay Area called Lehrhaus Judaica? It was founded in 1974, taking as its name the German word Lehrhaus (meaning "house of learning") and finding its inspiration from a school for Jewish studies founded by philosopher Franz Rosenzweig in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1920. The original Lehrhaus — until its clo-

sure by the Nazis — was the focal point of a Jewish intellectual revival between the wars. Attracting scholars such as Martin Buber, S.Y. Agnon, A.J. Heschel, Gershom Scholem, and Erich Fromm, dialogue between the student and teacher was the primary method of learning, which, according to Rosenzweig and Buber, "could restore something genuinely Jewish to the Western intellectual."

Why am I focusing on this 40 year old linchpin of Bay Area Jewish learning? I want to inform you, the members of CBT, that on February 9th, beginning at 9:30am, the religious school staff, Rabbi Asher, Cantor Chabon, and I will be hosting a Lehrhauslike morning of fun and learning for members of all ages. We will be offering 50 minute classes that will engage and enlighten grandparents, parents, and even kindergartners. We will be offering a wide array of classes that will show off the strengths of our educational instructors. Unlike Lehrhaus Judaica classes, this event is FREE of charge and will replace the normal religious school classes that morning. This is billed as a "Day of Learning at CBT." More specific information will arrive in your inboxes by mid-January. Suffice it to say that this will be an event you will not want to miss. I am looking for this to be an opportunity for families to learn together and empty nesters to come and learn on a Sunday morning. Adult Education

JEWS IN AMERICA

When we read American history or study it in our schools, there is seldom much mention of the Jews. Most Americans might judge from this that the Jewish people have had little to do with the history of the United States, or that the Jews are newcomers who arrived after others had founded the nation and made it great. But this happens to be far from the truth.

- On Columbus' first voyage, five members of his crew were Jews. One of the first to set foot on the New World was a Jew.
- The earliest pilgrims who settled the "New England" of America were Puritan refugees escaping religious persecutions in Europe. These Puritans viewed their emigration from England as a virtual re-enactment of the Jewish exodus from Egypt. To them, England was Egypt, the king was Pharaoh, the Atlantic Ocean was the Red Sea.
- Many of our oldest colleges adopted Hebrew words as part of their official seal. The Yale seal shows an open book with the Hebrew "Urim V'Tumim," a part of the breastplate of the High Priest in the days of the Temple.
- The first design for the official seal of the United States recommended by Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson in 1776 depicts Jews crossing the Red Sea.
- The inscription on the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia is a direct quote from the Torah: "Proclaim liberty throughout the land for all the inhabitants thereof."
- President George Washington sent a letter at the opening of the first synagogue in America in Newport, Rhode Island in 1790: "May the children of Abraham who dwell in the land continue to enjoy the goodwill of the other inhabitants, while everyone shall sit safely under his own vine and there shall be none to make him afraid."
- Throughout our history, Jews have played and continue to play an extraordinary role on the American scene, whether it be in our arts, politics, finance, sports, literature or education.


