Shalom, B'nai Tikvah!

"Each of us has a name," the Israeli poet Zelda wrote, "given by God and given by our parents/ Each of us has a name given by our stature and our smile." Her words are both artful and thought provoking, calling us to deeper reflection. Names are of utmost significance within Jewish tradition. They link us to generations past. When we, or a new child in our family, are named in memory of a loved one we have lost, that person becomes a part of our identity... linked to our heart in a unique way even if we never had a chance to meet. Some stories of how we get our names are more whimsical; I once knew a Samantha so named because her older sister loved the television show "Bewitched!" Then there are the Biblical names, which offer opportunities to articulate connections we feel

with our ancestors and what their legacy represents for us.

All this is to say that on Friday January 9, our 6:30pm Shabbat service will offer us an opportunity to learn more about Hebrew names and contemporary Jewish naming rituals with Dawn Kepler, the founding director of "Building Jewish Bridges" (see p. 9). This will be an informative and engaging presentation for all of us, coinciding with the beginning of the second book of the Torah whose Hebrew name is Shemot, or names. Shemot marks the very beginning of the transition from the family narratives of Bereishit (Genesis) to our formation into the people of Israel.

Another upcoming program at B'nai Tikvah it's a pleasure to highlight will take place on Tuesday, February 17 at 7:00pm (see p. 7). Rabbi Sue Levi Elwell, editor of a new anthology called "Chapters of the Heart: Jewish Women Sharing the Torah of our Lives" will join us for an evening of reading, dialogue and book-signing. Hers is a powerful book that invites us as readers to consider different stages, struggles and milestones of our lives through a Jewish lens. As each writer threads a piece of her own story

My friends who came to the concert from other communities all told me how infectious the energy was in our building. President's Message

How did we come so quickly to the end of a year and the beginning of a new one? Maybe it's my age, or just how busy last year has been as President of our temple, as a member of the board, as a professional, and as a parent. Looking back, though, how can I ask for a more enriching year? There has been real joy for our temple and our community. So

much positive change for many of us.

On the flip side, there has been challenges for others. Some in our community have been challenged by our changes. Outside of our walls, the world seems to have shifted on its axis. This summer Mary Ann and I were in Israel during a tough conflict. After many years of quiet, a tragedy happened. And Europe has seen more anti-semitism than many years before. In Missouri and New York, tragedies of social justice and tolerance happened. Funny how we remember the not-so-good things and we somehow forget the wonder we all still experience.

Rabbi Asher's retirement and Rabbi Gutterman's recruitment are jewels we can gaze at from this past year. Beautiful holiday rituals and events, and a significant number of new families and members. A bright spot for me was receiving emails from a new partnership with Rabbi Edgar Nof from the Reform Temple in Netanya. Just take a moment to read how bright a light he provides in Israel: "I was teaching this week in many groups, about (sic., our matriarch) Rebecca's search for meaning in her life, and how many times each one of us asks what are we meant to do. I have chosen the path of making bridges of connection between Jews and the Jewish tradition, between Jews, Druze, Christians and Muslims and between liberal Jews in Israel and liberal Jews in America and Europe."

"What are we meant to do?" is one of the age-old questions and one for all of us to consider going into the new year. My personal answer is Tikkun Olam - Repair The World. And your definition of "the world" will be different from mine. To me, it's in part our temple, in part our community at large, in part, the greater world. I choose to do little things that make a difference. I don't have resolutions for the new year, I just listen and answer the calls of need.

I am asking everyone in our temple to do the same - to find meaning in all you do, no matter how small it is. I am still asking for 100% participation in the High Holiday Appeal. That's a place you can help. Another is in activities at our temple that enrich us all. We need more people to volunteer - for our upcoming gala, in attending programs, in starting chavura's. The temple needs your contributions and a little of your time. Act locally.

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Turn It. Turn It

How many of you have heard of the organization in the SF Bay Area called Lehrhaus Judaica? It was founded in 1974, taking as its name the German word Lehrhaus (meaning "house of learning") and finding its inspiration from a school for Jewish studies founded by philosopher Franz Rosenzweig in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1920. The original Lehrhaus — until its clo-

sure by the Nazis — was the focal point of a Jewish intellectual revival between the wars. Attracting scholars such as Martin Buber, S.Y. Agnon, A.J. Heschel, Gershom Scholem, and Erich Fromm, dialogue between the student and teacher was the primary method of learning, which, according to Rosenzweig and Buber, "could restore something genuinely Jewish to the Western intellectual."

Why am I focusing on this 40 year old linchpin of Bay Area Jewish learning? I want to inform you, the members of CBT, that on February 8, beginning at 9:30am, the religious school staff, Rabbi Gutterman, Cantor Chabon, and I will be hosting a Lehrhaus-like morning of fun and learning for members of all ages. This special morning of education is being provided as a way of allowing the CBT community (Religious School families, parents with teens, empty nesters, couples with no children, singles of any age - any member of CBT) to come together and experience learning of various modalities from the educators of the synagogue. Just as we did last year, we will be offering 50 minute classes that will engage and enlighten grandparents, parents, and even kindergartners. We will be offering a wide array of classes that will show off the strengths of our educational instructors. If you are looking to exercise your brain, we have classes that will engage you intellectually. If you are looking to exercise your body, we will have a class that will make you "shvitz." If you wish to learn through experience, we will have various "kinesthetic-style" classes. There will be offerings for all types of learners - young, a bit older than young, and not as young as you used to be but still feel young at heart. Unlike Lehrhaus Judaica classes, this event is FREE of charge and will replace the normal religious school classes that morning. This is billed as a "Day of Learning at CBT." Suffice it to say that this will be an event you will not want to miss. I am looking for this to be an opportunity for families to learn together and empty nesters to come and learn on a Sunday morning. I want to see generations of CBT'ers to arrive at 25 Hillcroft Way and be treated to an educational smorgasbord that will delight your palate. Come one, call all on Sunday February 8, 2015 to CBT's Religious School "Day of Learning." I have a feeling you will not regret it.

- **♦ The Jewish Calendar** (Instructor ZVIA BITANSKY) A holiday is on its way! Which will it be? Who is the bearer of holiday tidings? The Jewish calendar, of course. Yes, we have our very own calendar! It is different than the civil (or Gregorian) calendar. The Jewish calendar is a lunar calendar that is adjusted. It divides time according to the cycles of the moon. To understand what that means you need to become a moon watcher. Join me in learning and exploring the story of the Jewish Calendar.



Over the years they have stayed close and now they both teach at Contra Costa Midrasha.

So while it may seem like Midrasha is only a place for social interactions, those friendships are the foundation upon which all Jewish connections happen. For example, both our 11th and 12th grade students are deeply bonded as classes. It allows the teens to be vulnerable with each other. In turn, this enables their educators to hold meaningful conversations that are impactful and transformative.



CBT's Tzedakah Recipient for January-March: Social Action's next meeting will be Tuesday, January 6th at 7:00 pm. Please join us to hear a presentation, by Amy Lynch, director of <u>ARM of Care</u>, which is a local agency that provides expressive arts therapies (art, recreation, movement) to youth in our area who have been victims of human trafficking. ARM of Care currently has partnered with 6 agencies serving sexually exploited youth and is continuing to expand. For the months of January through March, ARM of Care will be B'nai Tikvah's Tzedakah recipient. Hope that you can come to hear about this important work. Light refreshments will be served.

Update on DACA: The Social Action Committee is continuing its involvement with the Multi-Faith Immigration Coalition for Action (MICA) supporting immigration justice programs. Last year MICA launched a successful program to provide financial assistance and general support to Dreamers and their families who were applying for Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status. Over \$5000 was raised by congregations supporting 20 applicants, but more is needed. There is now a waiting list and this spring a similar process will begin for the estimated 5 million undocumented parents of U.S. citizens who will be eligible for new status under President Obama's Executive Order. MICA is also participating in a program to assist undocumented immigrants and children who have been released on bond awaiting deportation proceedings. A change of clothes, toiletries, and snacks are being collected and volunteers are also needed to accompany these people to airports, bus stations, or back to families in whose custody they have been released. 
