## Shalom, B'nai Tikvah!

The Psalmist wrote: "Teach us to number our days, that we may acquire a heart of wisdom." There could hardly be more appropriate words for the period of time we now find ourselves in, between the holidays of Pesach and Shavuot. (See my esteemed colleague and friend Cantor Chabon's column for more on Shavuot!)

This season is known as the Counting of the Omer. In ancient days, our ancestors would offer their first barley sheaf at the Temple in Jerusalem on the second day of Passover as an expression of thanksgiving. From there, following the commandment in the Torah, they would count ahead to Shavuot, a celebration of the full harvest.

Today, while we are no longer primarily an agrarian people, we continue the practice of counting these days forward, from the evening of the second Seder to the night before Shavuot.

Like so many of our rituals, counting the Omer has acquired multiple meanings over time. Beyond its original agricultural significance, numbering these days has become a way for us to experience the link between physical freedom (marked by the Exodus from Egypt), and spiritual purpose — which began with the Revelation of the Torah at Sinai. Every year, as we tell the story of our redemption from slavery, we are reminded that the story does not end there. Freedom is just the beginning. Over time, our story becomes more complex, more heartbreaking, more interesting, and in the end more *ours* – holding at its center the obligation to remain true to the principles of Torah, and to live with a sense of God's presence in our lives.

Counting the Omer also gives us reason to think about how we make our actions count in the world. What sparks us to carry out an

## Reflections...

On Sunday, May 24<sup>th</sup>, Jews across the world will celebrate Shavuot, one of the most beautiful and most neglected of our holidays. In contrast to Passover—a holiday that is loved and celebrated by even the least observant Jews—Shavuot is a holiday that many Jews haven't even heard of, let alone celebrated. Yet it is the day on which we commemorate revelation, the receiving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. Most Jews certainly understand the centrality and importance of the Torah. So how did we, as a people, lose our connection to the day on which it was given to us?

The challenge we face each year on Shavuot is how to recommit ourselves to the covenant that our ancestors accepted for us. They made an enormous leap of faith when they received the Torah at Sinai, from idolatry and polytheism to the acceptance of one intangible God. Their bravery laid the foundation for the Judaism we practice today. Yet what are we doing to keep their courage and faith alive? Are we continuing to examine our relationship to the Torah for ways in which to renew our commitment to God, or have we become complacent in what it means to be the guardians of this holy book?

It is customary on Shavuot to stay up all night studying Torah as a symbol of our renewed acceptance of the covenant. In Jerusalem, people who study throughout the night make a pilgrimage to the western wall to pray the morning service immediately at daybreak. It is a spectacular site to see thousands of exhausted and exhilarated Jews marching together to greet the morning. After the morning service the entire congregation gathers for the reading of the Ten Commandments. It is truly a magnificent experience.

This year at B'nai Tikvah, we will draw upon that early morning magic and celebrate Shavuot at sunrise. It is incredibly powerful to



#### COUNTING THE OMER 'GRAIN' DRIVE

The Torah commands that the first sheaf, or Omer, of the new harvest should be offered as a sacrifice of thanksgiving. From that day, a period of seven weeks is to be counted, until the festival of Shavuot, and celebrations of the first harvest. Immediately following this commandment, the Torah commands that when we reap the harvest we shall not reap to the edges of the field or gather the gleanings.

For me, it's a short window of time to reflect on the changes I've seen them make and the impact they've made on Midrasha and the community here. Any and all members of our community are highly encouraged and welcome to join us. I invite you all to join us this year in particular to witness the beautiful bond that exists amongst this thoughtful and kind group of teens. I am confident their speeches will touch all of us. Of this year's graduating class of 18 teens, 5 of them hail from B'nai Tikvah – Sophie Babka, Melanie Barrall, Jared Brogdon, Dani Kiesler, and Jake Levy. Here is a brief preview of what's to come at graduation. They are some of my favorite excerpts from last year's graduates (class of 2014) from B'nai Tikvah:

✓ Arielle Restuch, a graduate from 2014 and the current Madrichim coordinator at B'nai Tikvah's Hebrew school shared this, "I am so grateful that I joined because all of the experiences, the opportunities that I've had, and the community has been one of the best things to happen to me. Midrasha eventually became like a family to me, I looked forward to going every week, and couldn't wait to see my friends. Midrasha is one of most loving and safe communities that I know. Midrasha has helped me grow so much as a person. It has helped me to really get to know myself better. At first Midrasha was just something fun to do on a Wednesday night, hanging out with friends and being Jewish, but in reality it has really helped me to grow and to change as I chose and has provided me with a safe community to be myself in."

✓ Aaron Barrall, also a member of last year's class had this to say about the Midrasha staff, "I simply cannot speak more positively about the staff here at Midrasha. Right here is a concentrated group of the coolest, most caring, honest and compassionate individuals I have ever met. They make Midrasha what it is."

✓ Melania Winslow, helped explain the new curriculum for seniors at Midrasha. "We learn a lot about ourselves Wednesday nights at Contra Costa Midrasha. That's one of the big differences between Midrasha and regular school, beside the donuts and the really awesome teachers. This year has been especially relevant in my life because everything we do in the senior class is meant to get us ready to go to college. We learn what it's going to be like in college and what Judaism says about all of these things, whether it is personal hygiene or our biggest fears or even budgeting. We were not given solutions we were given tools so that we could come up with the solution ourselves. Midrasha has made Judaism relevant in my everyday life, and now I can go into these new situations that I'm going to be faced with next year and feel prepared.

This Spring we are also working on last efforts to recruit our teens to travel to Israel together with the NFTY in Israel program. Right now, 11 teens from Contra Costa Midrasha (7 from B'nai Tikvah!) will travel together to Israel this summer. 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
