SHALOM, B'NAI TIKVAH!

What an amazing winter it's been... from January's Saturday night Jazz Concert to February's Red Carpet Evening with Mayim Bialik. Both events filled our synagogue to capacity, and were a powerful testament to our dynamism, volunteer commitment and community spirit. B'nai Tikvah is a true shining star!

It's an educationally rich season for our congregation as well. Our lay led Mussar group continues to meet and find its way towards regular study together, and new congregants are always welcome. The first session of "All In The Jewish Family" facilitated by Dawn Kepler of Lehrhaus Judaica was held on January 30. Attendees ranged from members to guests, parents of school age children to congregants with tales of grandparenthood to share! It was a remarkably open and honest session during which we all had the opportunity to learn more about the challenges and opportunities that go along with being a non-Jew involved in Judaism and synagogue life. By the time you read this, our second session on February 28 will have come and gone, but we hope you'll join us for the third and final one on Sunday March 13 from 10-11:30am in the Library, which will address issues of Jewish identity from a Reform perspective. (These sessions are free to CBT members, and \$5 each for the public).

And speaking of Lehrhaus, as promised in my last Tikvah Talk column, here are the details on the next series we're collaborating on. It's called "Walking in The Valley of the Shadow – And Not Being Afraid." Did you know it's been documented that the question of what happens to us after we die is the most common one that people ask of their religious traditions? Over the years, I have asked a range of students in different classes I've taught why they think this is. Responses have ranged from the urgency that goes with wanting loved ones we have lost to be at peace, to the hope we all hold in common that we will be remembered and will leave a legacy of meaning. Another answer that has stayed with me came about recently during a Midrasha class. In the words of one of our ninth graders: "well... we *like* living so of course we'd want to know what happens after we can't anymore."

Her words speak to the essence of what "Walking in the Valley of the Shadow..." is all about. There will be six sessions on topics such as conversations about end-of-life wishes, Jewish laws and traditions around mourning and burial practices, consoling mourners, and finding support for ourselves when we are the ones walking through that valley. Sessions will be led by area rabbis, doctors and mental health professionals, and will be

REFLECTIONS...

Twelve years ago, on July 1st, 2004, I walked through the doors of Congregation B'nai Tikvah to begin serving as your cantor. It was just weeks after my graduation from cantorial school, and I came to the synagogue brimming with enthusiasm for Judaism and for life in the pulpit. I didn't know much about what that life

would actually look like, but I knew with deep certainty that it was the life I was called to live.

That conviction is still with me today as strongly as it was then. I feel so very lucky to be doing work in this world that I feel I am meant to do. I know that many people cannot say that about their jobs, and I don't take that belief for granted. The more I have gotten to know our community, the more I want to engage with it and be an agent of transformation for our members. I have witnessed such exciting growth and change in the last 12 years, and I have been privileged to help nurture a thirst for learning and prayer that is so palpable here on Hillcroft Way. I want nothing more than to keep contributing to that growth in our community, but in order to do so, it is time for me to take a break to help recharge my own spiritual batteries, so to speak. Pulpit life is very taxing, especially with three young children at home. For that reason, I am thrilled to be taking a three month sabbatical starting on May 1st of this year.

The idea of sabbatical is biblical in origin, from Leviticus 25. It comes from God's instructions to the Israelites about how to treat the land of Israel in order to keep it rich and fertile:

When you enter the land that I assign to you, the land shall observe a Sabbath of the Eternal. Six years you may sow your field and six years you may prune your vineyard and gather in the yield. But in the seventh year the land shall have a Sabbath of the Eternal: you shall not sow your field or prune your vineyard. (Leviticus 25: 2-4)

The idea in this passage is that the land needs a year of rest, when it is not expected to give or produce, in order to replenish itself. Then the following year the yield will be full and productive. Most religious traditions have established this kind of sabbatical for their clergy for the very same reasons. In a job that requires so much teaching and giving, we need a rest every seven (or twelve!) years in order to give back to ourselves before returning to the work of caring for a community.

One of the many things I am looking forward to during my sabbatical is time spent visiting other congregations. I will fully enjoy the experience of being a congregant for a few months so that I can learn from what other synagogues are doing. Congregation B'nai Tikvah is a Reform congregation which, through personal attention, provides to its members an extended family. The congregation fulfills its members' spiritual needs, fosters their Jewish identity, promotes the perpetuation of Judaism and its members' Jewish education, and encourages a commitment to full participation in Temple life.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS

The Amazing Teaching Staff of CBT Religious School

Teachers never get enough credit (or appreciation or recognition) - that's my opinion and my experience as a teacher. Most of what teachers do happens in each individual classroom, between teachers and students. Teachers are, I

think, some of the most giving, thoughtful, hard-working people I've met. Most of this goes largely unnoticed by the public at large. That is why I'm dedicating this article to our outstanding teaching staff here at CBT Religious School.

Our teachers here at CBT are, quite simply, the very best. Let's take a tour of some of the classrooms and see what can happen on a typical day at CBT Religious School.

The first classroom we'll visit is the 3rd grade. Mora Zvia Bitansky is leading the students in learning how to take their knowledge of Hebrew letters and sounds, and blending them into words. It is in 3rd grade when students begin to read Hebrew. Every time I go in Mora Zvia's room, the students are focused and hard at work in a fun way. Her classroom is immaculate and organized. She takes her role very seriously and has done so for many, many years. My son, Izzy, is in this class, and one thing he learned recently from Mora Zvia is the different levels of tzedakah as taught by Maimonides—quite impressive to have that level of Jewish learning in 3rd grade, thanks to Mora Zvia.

Next class we go to is 6th grade with Mora Julia Babka-Kurzrock. Her classroom is, at times, a multi-media extravaganza. She continually uses sources from the internet including videos and informational sites to enhance her rich curriculum of deep knowledge of Israel with serious learning of Jewish values. Students also read Jewish-themed books and discuss them. The class even said prayers in simulcast with Jews in Jerusalem, praying at the Kotel (the Western Wall) via a website like "Kotel Cam." What an experience for those students! Thanks, Mora Julia, for always going above and beyond for your students, the Religious School, and CBT as a whole.

In Mora Ellen Fasman's 4th grade room, it's pretty zany - in a good way. The students are eating bagels (Mora Ellen brings one for each student every Sunday), learning prayers, thinking about and discussing the Torah, being steeped in the traditions of the holidays. I'll often pop in, and there they are, dressed in costumes, reading and acting out a script from a Torah or holiday story. Mora Ellen has been here at CBT for over 20 years, the longest of any teacher, and is still working hard every week to bring the very best to our students.

I wish I had room to feature all of our teachers, like Hagit Miller who does a great job with the 2^{nd} grade and the Art program; Aliza May, 5^{th} grade teacher extraordinaire; Julie Rubenstein, such a caring, warm teacher for the K/1 class; and Devra Aarons, along with me and the Rabbi who teach the 7^{th} grade.

We are blessed to have such a wonderful teaching staff here at CBT. It is the teachers that are the core of any school. Because of our teachers, we have a great Religious School for our children.

We are offering programming and outreach that we've never offered before and, through more events like our Red Carpet Evening with Mayim Bialk, an Evening of Jazz, and our extremely popular PreK programs, we hope to bring our membership up to more sustainable levels. **But we need your help**... Please continue to invite your friends and family to attend services and events at CBT in order to support our efforts to increase our membership. As we all know, CBT is a special place with a vibrant and passionate membership: We just need to let more people know!

On a final note for this issue, I want to mention one more reason your membership matters and why we need to sustain Jewish communities. In late January, a billboard along I-680 between Walnut Creek and Pleasant Hill was put up by a group called 'If America Knew' espousing the idea that the US should stop sending financial aid to Israel. The billboard says "We give Israel \$10 million a day. That money could send our kids to college." Closer inspection of the group's website – <u>ifamericaknew.org</u> – reveals a lot of anti-Zionist rhetoric along with prominent "Donate" and "Add to Cart" buttons. The Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) is coordinating responses from the Jewish community. This is our backyard and deserves our attention. Your Board of Trustees is closely monitoring the JCRC's work and will keep you informed as we learn more.

We hold three retreats a year, all at Camp Newman and in partnership together with all four Midrasha campuses. So teens from the Berkeley, Oakland, Contra Costa and Tri-Valley/Tri-City areas come together on these weekends to experience Shabbat, learn, relax, sign, play and more. The highlight of the weekend is our Havdalah ceremony. Lead by the incomparable Eric Schoen and under the light of the twinkling stars, our arms intertwined – they help our teens take a piece of the peace of Shabbat into the week ahead.
