SHALOM, B'NAI TIKVAH!

It's perhaps the greatest understatement of 5776 to say that it's been an eventful season, both at CBT, our spiritual home, and here at Michael's and my home. As you're no doubt aware by now, we were in the waiting phase of the adoption process when the proverbial call came that we had a match! We quickly made plans to meet in the birth mother's home state, and all decided to go forward with the placement. Returning to California we thought we would have until at least the end of March to before returning for the baby's birth. But as we were soon to discover, these little ones are full of surprises! Mere days later, we found ourselves hurrying back to Texas. On March 21, the day after he was born, we met our baby boy. He is alert, peaceful (much of the time!) and a source of joy and fulfillment beyond words. Jonah has made us a family.

Looking back on the past few years, I always hoped that we would have our child by Passover... or in time for the next Passover. The transmission of our central narrative, the very human themes of enslavement, freedom, dignity and empathy, is made all the more powerful through the commandment that we tell all this to our children. And they are all our children, whether our actual members of our family or not. We help them find their place in the story. And they help us find ours.

Then too, there is what happens immediately after that momentous crossing of the Red Sea. The Israelites take one look around, realize their lives are no longer bound to servitude and routine, and wail aloud their discontent and fear. I never thought I would find parallels between that dynamic and the initial days and weeks of parenthood. (Though luckily only one of us is wailing aloud so far!) I look around this brand new landscape and am filled with questions. Is he eating the right amount? What did that new noise mean? Is he okay? Is he happy? *Why can't I get the car seat out of the car?!* What lies ahead for this sweet boy, and how will we navigate all the passages to come?

Over and over, I've been told that the hours may pass slowly, but this time goes by in the blink of an eye. I remind myself to inhabit each moment fully as best I can, to treasure the subtle growth each day brings, and to be truly present with and for this little one. These strivings represent Jewish values that are alive and well for all of us in the weeks following Passover. This season is known as the counting of the Omer, during which we say a blessing each day and pause to take note of where we find ourselves on the historical and contemporary routes from our initial steps towards freedom to the revelation of Torah at

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Frank Talk... and some amazing opportunities: All part of Tikvah 2.0.

In the last issue of Tikvah Talk, I shared how our membership has declined over the past several years. Our high was 353 member units in 2013 and our low is, well, now at 309 member units. Recall that a member unit is essentially a household with any members in that household comprising the member unit. So there's the frank talk on membership. Later on I'll share with you what your Board of Directors is doing to turn the tide.

As you might imagine, our membership decline translates to an income decline since the vast majority of our income comes from our membership commitments. Are they directly proportional? Of course not. B'nai Tikvah will never turn away members who cannot afford to pay our full membership commitment; however, we're hearing from more and more of you that the membership commitment is too much. Touchy (and a little scary) subject for me to write about? You bet. But you deserve to understand our situation so that you can help us create a vibrant and sustained community.

In the coming months, we will host a series of meetings open to the entire membership. These meetings will start with our annual congregational meeting on Sunday May 22 at 9:45 am and continue roughly each quarter for you to come and talk with us about our community challenges and opportunities. Driving toward a sustainable synagogue is something we all want; we just need to figure out how to make it happen. At the May 22 Congregational meeting – which I urge you all to attend – we'll discuss our 2016 / 2017 budget that shows a deficit.

Know that your Board of Directors and I have done a lot of work paring this deficit down as best we can; however, without drastic action (or maybe me tripping over a few bags of money), a budget deficit is what we're facing. Rest assured that B'nai Tikvah is very solvent with sufficient cash reserves in the bank. Our deficit is more than an order of magnitude less than our reserves. Still no organization can survive with consistent deficits and we are considering a number of alternatives – from mild to wild – to close the gap early in our fiscal year which is June through July.

OK...Enough frank talk, let's get to the good, no the great stuff happening in our community!

In April, Rabbi Gutterman and her husband Michael became proud parents by adopting a little boy, Jonah. We're thrilled for

SISTERHOOD NEWS

Our Sisterhood Shabbat was well attended with several people reading and many people opening the Ark. Two members of the FUNDaFIELD team spoke about the women in Uganda that have been helped by selling paper beads. Before the women started making beads, they made gravel from rocks for \$1 a day. Making beads is bringing them \$5 a day, which is enough to live on. Sixty women and their children have been relocated from a displaced person's camp to their own homes. Both of the team members, who are students at Monte Vista High School, spoke about visiting the families in Uganda. I think everyone was impressed by the presentation and uplifted to be part of such a wonderful organization.

Our Sisterhood woman of the year deserves this award on so many levels but there are two I want to highlight. The first one will pull at your heartstrings.... It did all of ours as we watched it go on.

A few years ago one of our dear members, a single parent, passed away suddenly, leaving a 17-year-old daughter alone. The family dynamics were very delicate and the daughter's legal guardian was in Southern California. How could a high school senior, so integrated in her school, her synagogue, her life here, suddenly get uprooted and move? She couldn't. Our special woman jumped in, took the young woman into her heart and home, rearranging her own family and became her legal guardian. Needless to say, there were court visits, attorneys, sleepless nights, and underneath it, a 17 year old missing her loving father. This woman helped Natalie get through a very rough time. And because Natalie was a senior, this woman helped her select a college and moved her there. Now, 3 years later, she is still "acting mother" to Natalie.

Last year this woman, after playing a Podcast in her classroom, contacted Mayim Bialik and asked her to come to CBT and speak. With her persistence and passion, she managed to get Mayim's speaking fee to become affordable. In times when it's hard to round up volunteers, she assembled some 40 volunteers to make this event a fabulous success! The Red Carpet Evening with Mayim Bialik was an event above and beyond anything we have done before.

There are many other things she has done that are special. She's our 6th grade teacher, she tutors B'nai Mitzvah students privately, she is the Secretary on our Board of Directors, she and Bonnie (Tornheim) have added a number of membership events to our calendars for all different ages. You name it, she seems to be involved in it. All this while keeping up with her family and other commitments.

Shalom, B'nai Tikvah! This is a fitting way to begin this article, for it is saying "Hello" and "Goodbye" from me and Leeaht as we come to the end of our tenure as Interim Directors of Education here at CBT. She and I have had a great time leading our school, and have felt

honored to have served our community in this way. Thank you for your trust, support and assistance during this school year.

I want to share some of the highlights from our school over the past few months. First, a big Mazel Tov to the 7th grade and teachers Devra Aarons and that other guy (Jason Pollack) for making this year's Mishloach Minot a special event. Mishloach Minot, a mitzvah for Purim, is the making of gift baskets with goodies such as hamentashen, tea, chocolate for special people in one's lives and community. In the past, the 7th graders had made Mishloach Minot baskets and given them to anonymous people at the Reutlinger Community for Jewish Living. This is a fine thing to do, but Leeaht had the idea to make it more personal to the community of B'nai Tikvah. As such, we decided to give baskets to the elders of CBT, the long-standing older members of our congregation. Nineteen baskets by the 7th grade students were delivered by the parents and teachers of the 7th grade from Concord and Pleasant Hill, to Danville and San Ramon, from right here in Walnut Creek, to Oakland. The response to these baskets was tremendous. We received handwritten thank-you cards from four different members, phone calls of thanks, even a thoughtful donation from one appreciative couple. One person, Jeanne Kaiser, was so moved by receiving the basket that she decided to come to our school on a Sunday to personally thank the 7th graders for their kind and thoughtful work - this was a big effort on her part! It was very touching to see this meeting of young people being recognized for their kind efforts from an elder, two/three generations their senior. For me, it is a strong reminder that small acts of kindness and thoughtfulness, mitzvot, can have a great impact.



Other highlights include the great work Julia Babka-Kurzrock does for our school by bringing films from the Contra Costa Jewish Film Festival to our students. This year, instead of having to go to a theater, we had two films shown at our school campus here at CBT. The first film was "David," and the second film was "Little Heroes." Both were well received by students, staff and parents who came to see the films. Popcorn was served and a great time was had by all.

Shalom! A big note of thanks to you, our community partners at B'nai Tikvah for your inspiring support at our annual Gala, February 20th. The theme of the evening's fundraiser was "Awesome 80's!" So many participants showed up in 80's gear, enjoyed throw-back tunes (think New Wave and Hair Bands), and got photos in front of the DeLorian. (More importantly, the evening raised funds through your generosity (Thanks again!) for Contra Costa Midrasha's scholarship fund – enabling any teen who wants to participate in our Wednesday night program, weekend retreats or teen trips to Israel. Havdalah is the heart and soul of Midrasha. It's Jewish magic – and our teens need it. Why? It's pretty challenging to be a Jewish teen here in Contra Costa County. Most of our teens are the minority at their school - they have to fight to get the High Holidays off, and celebrating Shabbat is rarely an option – there's just too much to do. Midrasha is the place that feeds the souls of our teens and Havdalah is the microcosm of that experience. It's a time for our teens to be separate from the rest of their secular world, to be Jewish – unapologetically – and to do so with the most amazing ruach/spirit you will ever witness.



DYING/DEATH/BURIAL: WHAT JEWS DO


Tuesday, July 5 7:00 pm – taught by Rabbi Stuart Kelman
