Everyone has a digital camera in hand or in the pocket. That is not to say that everyone is a photographer, it just means that everyone has a visual mode of expression within reach.

We all post to email, Facebook, to Instagram or to our cloud chamber albums somewhere out there in digital space. So here are some suggestions next time you point and shoot:

First, please do not "TAKE" a picture. That would be stealing and we are commanded not to do that. You may record a composition, make a picture or capture a visual moment. All are Kosher ways that elevate camera-speak.

Second, focus on the eyes of the person in your image. The eyes are sacred. They are the passageways into the depths of a person. Somewhere in the other is the resonating soul and the Holy-seeking heart.

Next, every click of the shutter stops history in motion. The family, friends and events existing in time that you record are your footsteps, your impressions left in the trail, your personal journey from one passage to another. Make us proud of your walk-about encounters.

Every image posted to the Internet is there forever. It's far more permanent than a tattoo.

Reflections...

A few weeks ago, we read in parshat Yitro about how Jethro, Moses's father in law, helped him set up a judiciary system for leading the people after the Exodus. The parsha opens with Moses sitting "as a magistrate among the people, while the people stood about Moses from morning until evening." (Ex 18: 13) Jethro sees Moses working as the only judge and the people standing in line to meet with him all day long. He comes to Moses and says, "The thing you are doing is not right; you will surely wear yourself out, and these people as well. For the task is *haved mimha*—too heavy—for you; you cannot do it alone." (Ex 18: 17-18) He then shows Moses how he can delegate responsibility to the wise and respected leaders within the community, asking them to judge the minor disputes themselves and to bring only the major disputes to Moses. With the new system, the burden of responsibility is shared among the people, and

no one gets too exhausted from doing too much, Moses in particular.

This is a very well known parsha, not just because of the judicial system that is set up, but also because what follows is what we call *the revelation* - the receiving of the 10 Commandments at Sinai. Nothing is random in the Torah, and I believe that the revelation is found in parshat Yitro because God did not think that the Israelites were capable of receiving the Torah until their community was more organized and ready to take responsibility for itself.

I bring this up today because I have been thinking a lot while the rabbi is on sabbatical about how our B'nai Tikvah community is organized. Rabbi Asher is taking a very well-deserved break from leading us because being a rabbi (and a cantor!) is a very taxing job, even at the most well-organized synagogues. No one becomes clergy without the understanding that it is a physically and emotionally intense job to lead a community. That intensity is one of the many reasons we become clergy in the first place, because we want to be there for people at the most important moments of their lives. But that doesn't mean that we want to carry all of the responsibility ourselves. We also become clergy- and not psychologists in private practice, for example- because we want to work *in community*, with the opinions and wisdom and skills of community members supporting us as well.

Congregation B'nai Tikvah is a Reform congregation which, through personal attention, provides to its members an extended family. The congregation fulfills its members' spiritual needs, fosters their Jewish identity, promotes the perpetuation of Judaism and its members' Jewish education, and encourages a commitment to full participation in Temple life.

For most of you, these lyrics are familiar. They are based upon the first verse from Psalm 96. Julie Silver, a well-known musician, composed this song and it has become a mainstay within the world of "Jewish music." Many artists derive their inspiration for songs from our liturgy and our sacred texts. Debbie Friedman, Craig Taubman, Jeff Klepper, Rabbi Joe Black, and, more recently, Dan Nichols and Rick Recht, are just a few of the household names that dot the pages of song books across America. In the 1960's, Shlomo Carlebach was the Eminem of his time. Look back at the pages of the Hebrew Tanach and you will find Miriam dancing with her timbral, King David singing his praises in the Psalms, and even a whole book entitled Song of Songs. Music is deeply rooted in our culture and our past and is going strong today. There is even an internet radio station called "Jewish Rock Radio" which plays contemporary music from such artists as Matisyahu, Josh Nelson, and Israeli rock singer/bands.

My cameras are certainly Jewish and photography is for me a religious ritual. My goal is to record surprise, to stimulate the mind and the senses and to inspire within a Jewish context. To capture in the moment a wondrous sight and to give someone pause to reflect and to consider it may, in fact, bring the viewer right up to the portal of the Shabbat.

I wish you good shooting and sharing.

We did not choose to work at a computer all day or to start our own businesses. We chose to weave ourselves into the fabric of Jewish communities, with all of the beauty and complexity that that choice brings with it.

All of this is to say that as wonderful and kind and warm as B'nai Tikvah is, I think we can do better. We have brilliant, creative people in our synagogue who CHOSE to join B'nai Tikvah. Why aren't more of those amazing people CHOOS-ING to offer their talents and gifts to make this shul even better than it is? There is a small group of people who volunteer for just about every job in this synagogue, and they are vital to our survival and growth. But we cannot depend on just a handful volunteers any more than we can depend on Rabbi Asher to make every decision for B'nai Tikvah by himself, without the wisdom and guidance of the leaders of our community helping him. We can do better.

I would like to recommend that every one of you think of how you can offer your time and talents to B'nai Tikvah in the coming months. This is a critical time in the life of our synagogue. Rabbi Asher is retiring at the end of next year, and people are already engaged in deep conversation about who we are, who we want to be and who the rabbi is who will help us achieve that dream. We cannot know the answer to who the B'nai Tikvah of the future is going to be without all of YOU helping us to understand who we are now. Please participate in a focus group. Please consider volunteering for one job, ONE event, just ONE, so we can know you better. It is the people who are the life force of every community. We have such wonderful people who belong to our synagogue, but we see so few of you throughout the year outside of the occasional Shabbat service or class or drop-off at Hebrew school.

You are the chieftains and judges who Moses learned to depend upon when his burden was too heavy to bear. You are the people who helped the Israelites prepare for the next stage of their journey through the desert, for the revelation at Sinai. Help us prepare for our next stage here at CBT. It is the legacy of the Jewish people to give of yourselves to the communities you love. I challenge you to embrace that legacy in the coming months and help us to become the best community we can possibly be.

Sunday Morning Music with Kindergartners

We want to start off by thanking John Rubenfeld and the board for their expression of confidence in us. We are truly honored to be charged with conducting a successful search for Rabbi Asher's successor. It is a responsibility that we take very seriously and will do our best to live up to the task.

While Rabbi Asher does not retire until June 30, 2014, we need to get this process started now, and the schedule has a lot of steps in a fairly short time line. Ideally, we would like to have our selection completed by the end of this year. This is in part to facilitate a smooth transition so that we will hopefully get to know our new rabbi well before that date comes. Also, a potential candidate will need to give notice to their current congregation.

The time line for our process will have these basic steps:

February – June: Information Gathering

We will be gathering information to be able to describe what we want in our new rabbi and what we are as a congregation. Our goal is not to get a perfect rabbi, but a perfect fit for our community.

Many of you have participated or will participate in one of the most crucial information gathering steps – the focus group. As of this writing we have held focus groups on February 10 and February 19 and will hold one more on March 3. Each of these initial focus groups covers the same fundamental questions as we begin our search for a new rabbi. For those who have already participated in one, they have been both fun and informative and quite revealing. The questions that we are using in the focus group, derived from the application form, are:

- Question #1 What are the top three qualities you are looking for in a new Rabbi?
- Question #2 What should be the top three most important priorities for our new rabbi?
- Question #3 What is the single most important thing you would want a new Rabbi to know about this congregation?

June: CBT Application Submission

We will be submitting a very detailed application to the Rabbinic Placement Commission – a joint group of URJ (the Union for Reform Judaism), the CCAR (Central Conference of American Rabbis) and HUC (Hebrew Union College). These are the affiliated groups that train our rabbis and provide us support as a Reform congregation. This Commission and its member bodies are set up to facilitate this search process and help ensure we have a good fit for our congregation.

July through fall: Rabbi Application Reviews and Interviews

A few weeks after we submit our application, we should start receiving formal expressions of interest from rabbis. Due to the size of our congregation, candidates must have at least 3 years experience as a congregational rabbi. Our search committee will then do initial interviews by phone or "Skype" and select the most promising candidate or candidates to come here in person and meet with us.

Late Fall: Candidate Approval

Ultimately the search committee will make a recommendation to the Board, and the Board will make a decision that the congregation will need to approve.

Rabbi Search Committee

While we are the chairpersons, we anticipate having a modest size committee to help coordinate the tasks outlined above. Being on the search committee will entail quite a bit of work beyond just attending meetings (and, yes, there will be many meetings) – including preparing the application, reviewing the "applications", participating in initial interviews, deciding on those to have visit and making all the arrangements for those visits, including travel and interview related activities, making final recommendations to the Board, negotiating a contract and settling in the new rabbi.

Let us know if you think you might be interested in being on the search committee. It will be relatively small, so we expect interest may well exceed opportunities. It should reflect the diversity of our membership. It will require time commitments for significant

During "Shir Joy" services, a Midrasha representative will also talk about the impact of Midrasha on his/her life. This will be a great night to learn more about Midrasha, to share in a meal together and to get to know one another.

Another great chance to celebrate Midrasha is on March 2nd, at our annual fundraiser event. This year's theme is "Midnight at the Circus." It will feature aerialist performers, fabulous food and drink, live music and auctions! Please join in the fun at 6:30pm at Beth Chaim Congregation. You won't want to miss it!

Finally, we've spent a lot of time this year strengthening our programs. A grant from the Brenden Mann Foundation is enabling us to rewrite our 10th grade Israel curriculum – making it very up to date and relevant to the daily lives of our teens. It's been working so well that this class has a high rate of attendance and often stays during break to continue talking and learning with their educator, Danny Fleischer. Our 11th grade program is also undergoing a rethinking. This is often a year of great stress for teens. We are working to create workshop evenings for these teens, in partnership with them, that directly address the challenges they are facing today. Together, these new initiatives are making the Midrasha world stronger and more effective in our work with teens.

Dear (Your College Student's Name went here....),




