From Where 9 Stand

I am encouraged by all the energy that has been generated around the discussion and search for my successor. My sabbatical gave me a foretaste of the creative possibilities of my retirement and role as an "emeritus" and it gave many congregants an opportunity to explore the great, unknown potential of a synagogue in transition. I'm as excited as many of you are to see what the future has in store for B'nai Tikvah.

In the meantime I don't plan to regard the next 14 months as a lame-duck rabbinate. My sabbatical didn't just draw back my mental curtain on a few retirement projects but on unfinished business in the congregation and the greater community. There are subjects I want to teach, sermons I need to give and simchas to enjoy with children who were babies or not yet born when we started in 1981.

I didn't care to travel over the last 3 months, but my reading explorations took me to pre-war Eastern Europe, to the great Jewish writers and historians of the 20th century, and to a great curiosity about the changing relation of clergy and laity in the American faith communities. Conversations with other baby boomers in the rabbinate and in the congregation have verified a continuing flow of projects and ideas that can extend far beyond the stereotypical card table or golf course.

As we all contemplate the years to come we might spend some more time contemplating the relationship of Rabbi and Congregant in this country where, for better or for worse, clergy of all faiths are no longer demi-gods or tyrants. We can reflect as well upon the potential of accepting the Rabbi's humanity and the layperson's expanded responsibility for the Jewish future.

Reflections...

I would like to invite you all to an incredible concert that is happening at 4:00pm on the afternoon of May 19th at Temple Isaiah. For the past three years, our CBT choir has collaborated with the choirs of Temple Isaiah and B'nai Shalom for an annual choral festival. It is the only time during the year that our three shuls come together to celebrate and sing, and it is a wonderful event every year.

This year, we are going to be joined by the Diablo Valley College Concert Chorale and the DVC Philharmonic to perform the Bloch Sacred Service. For those who may not know, this piece is considered THE Jewish choral/orchestral masterpiece of the 20th century. This year marks the 80th anniversary of the work. Here's a little history about the piece:

Ernest Bloch was working as the director of the San Francisco Conservatory in 1927 when he began speaking to Cantor Reuben Rinder of Temple Emanuel in San Francisco about writing music for a temple service. A few years later he was granted a commission to begin work on the project. What followed was 3 years of passionate devotion to the text and music that eventually became the Sacred Service, or *Avodath hakodesh*. According to Melvin Berger's "Guide to Choral Masterpieces," this is what Bloch had to say about immersing himself in the experience of writing the Sacred Service:

"I have now memorized entirely the whole Service in Hebrew. I know its significance word by word. But what is more important, I have absorbed it to the point that it has become mine, as if it were the very expression of my soul. It has become the very text I was after since the age of ten...a dream of stars, of forces. I do not wish it for the Jews—who will probably fight it—not for the critics, nor for the 'Tradition'! It has become a private affair between God and me."

The music is set to the text of the Shabbat morning service and it is an expansive and glorious choral masterpiece. Our choir has never sung anything as challenging or exciting as this piece. Adding to the excitement is that they will be joined by 100 other sing-

In Our Surrounding Community

The Contra Costa Interfaith Council has recently constructed and adopted the following position on gun violence:

"As people of diverse faith traditions, the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County and its Social Justice Alliance value human life as our most precious gift. Human rights are God given rights. We condemn the use of firearms against human beings and oppose the ready ability to obtain them. Therefore, we view the ongoing gun violence in our communities as a moral issue.

"In support of Faiths United to Prevent Gun Violence, a coalition of more than 40 faith groups nationwide, we call for immediate legislative action to:

Mandate background checks on every gun purchased, including those purchased at gun shows and in private sales.

Mandate the development and maintenance of a national gun registry data base.

Ban high capacity weapons, assault weapons, and high capacity magazines and restrict large purchases of ammo.

Make gun trafficking a federal crime.

"We call on all of our County and Bay Area Mayors to sign on to the Mayor's Petition Against Gun Violence (www.mayorsagainstillegalguns.org)."





I, on the other hand, was raised Conservative dedicated to Sunday school, Hebrew school and Hebrew High school. I was very active in the AZA - BBG youth organization and attended a Jewish camp, Camp Ha-Sha-Char for many years.

My desire to be involved with my congregation didn't stop at my Bar Mitzvah. I went on to be a Torah reader for the High Holidays as I stayed involved throughout my teen years. In my college years I became dedicated to my Health Science and Psychology major and working full time at Lucky Stores found, as a lot of us know, that there just aren't' enough hours in a day. Towards the end of my college years I became a certified Emergency Medical Technician with Alameda County.

I have 3 beautiful children. My daughter, Lauryn, will graduate from San Jose State University this year with a psychology degree and my son Ryan attends a junior college in Dublin. My son Mason is 13 and is a straight "A" student. He's doing a lot better in school than I did at his age and I'm very proud of all of them.

As time went on I was dedicated and devoted to my work and family. I met the love of my life, Amy, in passing in the frozen food aisle at the grocery store I managed. As time went on she thought I was Hispanic since I spoke Spanish, and when she found out I was Jewish, it almost knocked her off her seat. Meet Phil Paris




How can I ever express my thanks to my grandfather who only wanted to study medicine? Unfortunately, he was living in Russia under the Tsar and as a Jew was forbidden from entering medical school. But on coming to this country he instilled that love of medicine into my father, who in turn influenced my own path into the field of medicine. Still, applying to medical school was not an easy decision for me with my love of philosophy, music and the arts. But being a compulsive student, it was not hard to gain admission to Albert Einstein medical school in the Bronx, N.Y., only a few miles from my parents' home.

Being put off by the growing technology of medicine, I chose a rebellious path in those days, the choice of becoming a family doctor. For me, nothing could compete with the magic of that moment when I was alone my patient in the consultation room, listening, allowing them the time and silence they needed from me in order to

start opening up on the really important stuff, including the widely prevalent use of alcohol and drugs. After a while, I became a drug addiction specialist, attending in particular to those suffering from addiction to opiates. What was little know then, and what continues to fly under the radar, is the great success of long term treatment with methadone. Life destroying opiate addiction is successfully treated in over 80% of patients, an almost unheard of success rate in the treatment of serious illness. There were so many myths to overcome, the worst being the idea that patients were "addicted" to their methadone. Yes, they needed to continue to take their medication, but at the same time they were able to reclaim their health, their jobs and their family. Most important, they were able to reclaim their self-respect.

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
