Reflections...

Shana Tova!

I'd like to begin today by letting you in on a secret. A secret about Jewish clergy. You might think that because we went to seminary and have devoted our lives to this work, rabbis and cantors get some sort of VIP access to spiritual renewal. **But here's the secret: we don't.** We struggle to find inspiration and direction just like everyone else, especially as we prepare for these days of awe.

If you have ever sat in meditation or gone to a yoga class where you are meant to focus your attention on your breath, then you know that this is no easy task. It shouldn't be so hard, just sitting with yourself and your breath, but it is! Thoughts slowly begin to creep into your mind, taking away your attention, distracting you from the strangely challenging task of just breathing.

Now, one of the foundational principles of yoga and meditation is to calm the whirling of your mind, not so that your mind becomes blank, but so that you can begin to actually hear what it is that your heart is saying to you. The difference between these two ideas is quite significant. In the first, you spend your time and energy trying to make your thoughts go away, maybe chastising yourself for not being able to empty out your mind. That is certainly not a very loving practice.

The second idea encourages you to allow your thoughts to arise and to examine them for a few moments. Perhaps they are really mundane: what's for lunch, I really want some coffee, ich, I need a pedicure! But beneath those thoughts, more important ones begin to reveal themselves, and those are the thoughts that deserve our attention. Maybe your mind will drift to a conversation you had recently, to something stressful going on at work, to your children, a fight you had with a friend. *Maybe your mind is wandering right now*. Meditation teaches us that these are the thoughts and experiences in our lives that actually need some loving attention.

I was taught by one of my mentors in cantorial school that our high holyday preparations should begin after Tisha B'av. So every





Turn It, Turn It, Turn It Again

And this year I am also working as a teacher myself at my home synagogue, co-teaching the 7th grade on Thursday afternoons. So the question speaks to me on many levels. What I want all of you to think about is how each of you, parents of students currently in the school, parents of teens who recently finished the program, parents of future students, or parents of former students who are now waiting to have grandchildren attend school, can help support our teachers.

One way is to have your children attend classes on a regular basis. The more often your child attends the more likely they are to absorb the material that is being taught. Our teachers work very hard to create the best lessons that engage our children on multiple levels. The more a student attends class the more they will grasp the concepts taught. This helps with continuity and community. The teachers find great joy in seeing the mind and soul develop and this can only happen if they get the chance to see their students on a regularly.

Another way that you can support our teachers is by making their jobs easier through volunteering. Whether it is being a room parent who helps coordinate class/school functions, being a class photographer who helps document the weekly/monthly happenings in the class, being available to help with the all-school snack program, or it is being around to help with an in-class project or holiday event, just by being around and showing your child that you are invested in their educational development is very supportive to the teachers.

One more way to support the teachers is to ensure that what is being learned in the classroom becomes reality at home. If the student is learning about the Shabbat rituals, make sure that you have a family Shabbat dinner where the student can witness the rituals taking place. Try to erect Sukkah this year so the student can get the feeling of what it is like to decorate and eat within the temporary structure and not just the one at the synagogue. Celebrate holidays, attend Shabbat services on a Friday evening or Saturday morning, make a commitment to creating a home tzedakah project that will help support the community – whatever it is, ask your child what is going on in their class and reinforce the learning at home. This is the best way you can help support our teachers.

And please tell them thank you for their hard work and dedication on a regular basis. See what happens when you get involved. I know that you will be fulfilled and the school will be better off for it.

year, as the summer is ending, I start paying more attention to the interactions I have with the people in my life; I read more carefully, hoping to glean some inspiration from an unexpected word or sentence. I go to as many yoga classes as I can. But most of all, I try to listen more attentively to my own heart and soul, to find out what is really going on inside of myself each year.

This year, I went about the process as I always do, turning inward, listening more carefully to the world around me, looking in all the familiar places. But no matter where I looked or how hard I tried, I could not find the inspiration I was looking for. It was like there was a wall between me and the messages my heart was sending me and I didn't know how to break it down to find my way to this day. I began to feel a sense of desperation.

And in that deep, desperate place, a tiny thought kept poking its head up to be revealed. "You are not lost," it kept saying, "the message has been loud and clear this whole time. You just aren't listening." My heart was right, of course. I was stuck on this idea of what I SHOULD be hearing and feeling, as opposed to being present and allowing myself to just BE. I was hearing the message, but I was pushing it away, trying to bury it within myself, sure that it was wrong. It was only once I actually allowed myself to just breathe and LISTEN that everything became simple and clear. Here is what I heard:

SURRENDER

This is incredibly hard work! And trying to force it to move more quickly or smoothly only makes it harder. In fact, the idea that we are in control of the process at all is the real illusion. I spent weeks trying to force myself into a state of spiritual inspiration, when what my heart was begging me to hear was the idea that I just need to **surrender**. Surrender to the natural process that was unfolding within me; surrender to the enormity of the task at hand; surrender to the idea that what I am capable of--whatever we are all capable of--whether it feels good enough or not, is JUST RIGHT!

SURRENDER

I heard once from a rabbi friend of mine about a lesson he learned in rabbinical school about how to deliver a great sermon. Write the whole sermon, word for word, and then, 5 minutes before Shabbat, rip it up. He learned that you would remember 90 percent of what you intended to say, and that the most beautiful part of the sermon would end up being the moments when you struggled to remember the important details, because only then would your passion and love be apparent.

THAT is what God is asking of us today, what we are asking of ourselves. To rip up the script of what we expect to have happen here, and instead to surrender to what is ACTUALLY HAPPENING. To surrender to the reality of our lives, rather than what we think our lives SHOULD look like, and to forgive ourselves for our limitations year to year. To surrender to the act of listening to ourselves and to the incredible wisdom that we each have within our hearts and souls. Surrender and forgiveness. Maybe then-only then--will teshuvah, transformation, be possible.

We read in Shir Ha-Shirim Rabbah (5:2), an ancient midrashic text, "God says: My children, create for me a small opening of Teshuvah, as tiny as the head of a pin, and I will open for you openings that even wagons and chariots can pass through."

I would like to give you a sacred task, as we move into the unetaneh tokef. As I sing, as we sing, as we pray together over the next several minutes, I want to ask you to listen to yourselves. Without judgment. To observe the thoughts that arise and allow them to circle around your mind for a bit. To open your hearts to the messages that you keep buried within yourself most of the tiı ho th gi it' ev yo Of ga m

e messages that you keep buried within yoursen most of the
me. And when one thought in particular catches your attention,
old onto it. Sit with it. Maybe it's one relationship in your life
at needs healing, one quality of your own that needs to be for-
ven. Maybe it's one habit that you need to let go of. Or maybe
s something or someone you are incredibly grateful for. What-
ver it is, pick just one, the size of the head of a pin, and devote
our love and prayer to it. Surrender to it. We are all here with
ne goal in mind, teshuvah, return to ourselves, and if we all en-
age in this holy work together, we will bring about real transfor-
ation.

online, and most importantly consolidated all the resources (i.e. calendar, history, links, etc.) to just a "click."

When you reflect over the 31 year old history of CBT and all the incredible accomplishments our fellow members have contributed, Pat is either near or at top of that list. On behalf of the CBT community, we thank you for all that you've done!

Meet Pat Eisner

CBT has been a major part of our family's and my life since we joined in October 1981, after attending its first High Holiday services at the old JCC on Creekside Drive. At the time we had 2 young children, Dan and Deborah and we felt that we had found a home and family. Having grown up with parents who believed in volunteerism, I began volunteering at CBT, a task I have willingly continued in several capacities over the years, some of which are described below. As you can see, CBT is my second life.

I began as a member of the Oneg Committee which oversaw the Oneg Shabbats after services at both the old JCC and from approximately late 1983, at our present location (we held services at the Church while in escrow in the mid-1980's.) As our family grew with the addition of Jonathan, I continued to volunteer at the fundraisers. Chuck became the congregational treasurer, and I kept the books, pre-computer;. Every paycheck and bill went across our dining room table for two years in the mid-1980's. When Chuck became president in 1987, I was part of the Membership Committee. After his term concluded in 1989, I joined the Religious School Committee, and served as chair for several years in the early 1990's.

When we got our first home computer in the late 80's, I took over the membership database from Steve Jaspan, and maintained it, eventually writing a membership database program to help automate mailings and record-keeping for the Temple Office. In the same time frame, I was asked to take over the editorship of *Tikvah Talk*; Deborah helped design and create the updated layout. Though I handed *Tikvah Talk* to other temple members for brief periods, somehow it came back to me for several more years, through the mid 2000's. I have also maintained the CBT website since the mid 1990's. The web designs have been done through several iterations by my son Dan, so it has, indeed, been a family effort. Now both Dan and I serve on the Online Communications Committee.

All of the various computer work that I did early on led to my becoming the "IT department" for the Temple. I have been in charge of the computers in the office since we purchased the first computer perhaps 20 years ago.

All three of our children served as *madrichim*, and two went on to become Religious School teachers, and bar/bat mitzvah tutors at CBT and other synagogues. One has made his career in Jewish education. I hope that my children, who considered themselves part of a club of "children whose mothers spent way too much time at the Temple," will continue in the Eisner family tradition of Jewish volunteerism and service.

We will discuss how to stay connected to Judaism while at college and explore approaches to the big Jewish questions and life as a second semester senior.

Rodef Shalom: Cultivating Peace with Shlayma Shamberg and Jen Holzer - Also known as the "No-Hater Boot Camp for teens," this elective uses meditation at its core to engage in techniques for creating and cultivating peace (rodef shalom). Tikkun Olam (to heal or transform the Earth) will be a core theme as we look at peace within ourselves and in the larger communities of our families and the world.

Of course, it's not too late to join in the excitement. All Jewish teens in our community are welcome to join at Contra Costa Midrasha. In fact, our teens are encouraged to "Bring a Friend" all during October. Any teen whose "friend" enrolls in the Midrasha program will be given a \$10 iTunes card as a thank you for helping to expand our community.
