On Friday, December 10th, shortly after our modest celebrations have ended, I will be reflecting on our trip to Rome. I will also reflect on Nostra Aetate, the Catholic revision of its attitudes towards Jews and Judaism, that goes back only to 1965, but has effected great changes in Jewish-Christian relations.

Meanwhile, enjoy the delicacy of Chanukah unencumbered by religious icons and celebrate its power for freedom rather than domination.
