World Union for Progressive Judaism in SF and at CBT

Reform Jews from around the world will be gathering in the Bay Area in February for their Biennial Conference. There will be representatives from Israel, England, Australia, South Africa, and the Former Soviet Union among others. They are bound together by a commitment to Jewish pluralism, intellectual and spiritual inquiry of all kinds. They are committed to an Israel that can peer beyond its security concerns and political conflicts and imagine a Jewish State that is a 'light to the nations.' They are motivated by the idea of equal access of men and women

to Jewish ritual and the interpretation of our tradition, and to the inclusion of all Jews and non-Jews who have been drawn to the borders of synagogue life.

Of course, when dealing with a global Jewish diversity of thought and practice, there is no shortage of controversy as well. There are different aesthetics and levels of observance; there are differing conceptions of patrilineal descent and "Who is a Jew?"; there are communities that are as yet not as comfortable as we are in the Bay Area about LGBT issues. All this makes for an exciting conference.

B'nai Tikvah will be pleased to host an international contingent of guests at our Shabbat service Friday, February 11 at 6:30 pm. We are also looking for host families to welcome a few folks back to their homes for Shabbat dinners afterwards. If interested, contact me at the Temple and we can try to match you up with Jewish cultures you are familiar with or with which you want to become more familiar.

The World Union is a fabulous confederation of efforts that reminds us of the richness and vitality of Jewish life on every continent. Please let me know if you want an evening's exposure to our continental spread.

Reflections...

I have been asked many times by congregants to explain what is called the choreography of prayer: when to bow, when to stand, raise up on your toes, hold and kiss your tsitsit, turn to face the doors of the sanctuary, cover your eyes, etc...I absolutely love this aspect of prayer, and I think it is a crucial part of how to make prayer meaningful and powerful. I would like to devote my next few articles to the choreography of prayer, in the hope that explaining it will enhance your davening experience.

I believe that three factors combine to create a deep and soulful prayer experience: the ancient text, the beautiful melodies, and the choreography. They are each powerful in isolation, but in combination, they are magic. Take the

text, for example. I adore Hebrew, and it makes me incredibly happy to study the Torah in Hebrew. The English translation helps, but nothing compares to reading the Torah in our holy language. However, it seems obvious to me that being in shul would feel quite different--and quite diminished in meaning--if you read through the entire service in Hebrew, but without any music. This is especially true given how few people understand Hebrew. Just think of how many people come to services for Shir Joy and you will no doubt agree with me. People are drawn to services when they know there will be beautiful music to embellish our beautiful liturgy.

Now take this idea one step further. Imagine being at a Shir Joy service. You are enjoying the music and following along in the siddur. Then we come to the Barchu and the rabbi asks everyone to rise. This is the moment when we move from the more introductory psalms and enter into the central part of our prayer service. You stand, a little bit cautiously, because you can't ever quite remember if you are supposed to bow with me when I bow or after me, or maybe both times? And how far down do you bend? And when do you rise up? Suddenly your prayer enjoyment has been interrupted by uneasiness about the choreography when really, the choreography should ENHANCE your davening, not detract from it.

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President's Message

Turn It, Turn It, Turn It Again

The focus of the last two High Holy Days appeals has been the financial well-being of Congregation B'nai Tikvah. In 2009, the board decided that the Capital Campaign (which means the building mortgage) had to be the subject of the appeal. In 2010, the operating budget was our concern. Many congregants responded generously both times, but I am aware that some congregants worried about CBT being too fo-

cused on the congregation's welfare and not enough on the community beyond our walls. This seems particularly noticeable this winter, when we are not hosting or contributing to the Winter Nights program for the first time in many years. Although it was imperative to attend to the congregation's somewhat scary financial needs over the last two years, I completely agree with those who want to make sure we aren't forgetting about *tikkun olam*. With that in mind, I'd like to catch you up on the status of some of our longstanding Social Action events.

The CBT board is still fully committed to participating in Winter Nights, and, judging by the questions and comments I've heard, so are our congregants. So why aren't we doing it right now? For the 2010/2011 season, the Winter Nights organizers required all participating congregations to host for two weeks. Last season, they allowed us to fudge this requirement by hosting one week at CBT and one at Shell Ridge, but they really don't want the shelter guests to have to move after only one week. The organizers can impose this requirement because there are more churches and synagogues wanting to host than there are weeks that need hosting. Because of this happy problem, the organizers also asked some congregations to consider rotating out of the lineup for one year, with the guarantee that they could participate the next year. Given the difficulty of hosting at our site for two weeks, and the desire to let others participate, Jared Goldin and I decided, with our Shell Ridge counterparts, to take this season off. Next season (2011-2012) presents a different challenge because our facility will be experiencing an exceptional number of b'nai mitzvah ceremonies. Our hope is that Shell Ridge will be able to supply the physical space next season, while we at CBT supply most of the volunteers and supplies.

In the meantime, there are still opportunities to look outward. Sisterhood has selected the **Adopt-a-Family** program at the Center for the Vulnerable Child at Children's Hospital as this quarter's tsedaka recipient. Dropping some change in the lobby tsedaka box will directly help the program, while also reminding us of the opportunity to adopt families again next November. This project was brought to us by a congregant, Cookie Svingos, and serves as a great illustration of how one person's good idea can evolve into a powerful community builder.

We have reached the mid-point in the school year so it is only fitting to look back and reflect upon what has taken place. What I have observed over the course of the past 6 months is a religious school program that is vibrant and full of life. The students, teachers, and *madrichim* (teen assistants) come each week with smiles on their faces and enthusiasm in their souls. We have built a strong *k'hillah* (community) that

enjoys learning and engaging with Jewish material. Whether it is learning *Ivrit* (Hebrew), *Torah*, history, holidays, or Israel, each student leaves every Sunday feeling like the experience was worthwhile. From beginning the morning at 9:30am in *t'fillah* (prayer) with a hearty *Boker Tov* (good morning) to ending the day at 12 noon with *L'hitra'ot* (see you next time), each child has taken another step towards cementing their Jewish identity. Some of the highlights from the year so far:

- beginning each Sunday morning in t'fillah with the entire school in the amphitheatre or the sanctuary (depending on the weather)
- welcoming our new songleader Ben and his guitar and listening to the sound of Hebrew music resounding throughout the hallways
- ★ celebrating Hanukah with our first annual Zimriah musical show
- watching the Kindergarten class search for hidden Hebrew letters in their classroom each Sunday morning
- ⇔ observing K-3rd grade students stare with amazement at the flickering Havdallah candle in their classrooms each week
- having a conversation with the 7th graders during their "grill Mr. Phil" session
- competing with the 6th graders during a Jewish trivia contest entitled "Bluff-O-Mania"
- seeing the pride in the eyes of the 5th graders as they present their Jewish Hero reports
- witnessing the 2nd graders entangle themselves in a game of Hebrew Twister
- noticing the respect and intensity of the 4th graders during their Family Education morning with their parents as they went on a Torah Scavenger hunt, and while they held the unrolled Torah in their hands
- eating all different kinds of foods with the 7th graders and their parents at their Meal of Many Blessings.

There are so many other moments that go unnoticed by me as I try to be in every classroom every week. I invite you to join us on **Sunday February 27** for Parent's Day. You will have the opportunity to sit in on your child's class for the morning and observe the magic that I see each week. I know that you will find the morning well worth your time.

Our "Woman of the Year" was honored in January at the Sisterhood Shabbat. Many of you participated in the service. If you missed the service, our honoree this year is CBT President, Lisa Wenger. Lisa is a person who leads by example. Social Action was her passion until she became president. Lisa has had quite a few challenges during her Presidential term and met them well. It was my pleasure to honor Lisa, as well as husband Howard and daughter Emma as the nicest people in the world! Please thank Lisa for the many hours of dedication to CBT and its efforts.

Sisterhood had a wonderful docent lead tour of MOMA in January. We enjoyed the 75th anniversary exhibit and the photography of Henri Cartier-Bresson.

Sisterhood has selected the recipient of the Tzedeka proceeds for January through March - the Adopt-a-Family program from Children's Hospital in Oakland. This is one of our favorite charities.

So let's fix that and answer some of those questions. Barchu is the command form of the word Baruch, which means to bless or praise. When I (or any service leader) get up to lead the Barchu, what I am saying in the opening line is, "BARCHU et Adonai Hamvorach!" which means, "Praise God to whom praise is due forever!" I am commanding you, the congregation, to praise God, to say your responding line, "BARUCH Adonai hamvorach l'olam va'ed!" "Praised be Adonai to whom praise is due, now and forever!"

The bowing makes sense if you understand what you are saying. I bow alone when I say the opening line, because I am commanding the congregation at this significant moment in our service. You respond by praising God and bowing. You use your strong voice to sing out God's praise, and you show it by bowing your body in homage. Your voice, plus the Hebrew text, plus bowing, combine to mark a deep and ancient part of our liturgy. Interestingly, I then follow your bow with my own, along with another recitation of the "Baruch" line, because I have not yet recited the praise part of the barchu. I have only recited the command. So I need the opportunity to praise God as well. I love all the little details!

Now, how far do you bend and when do you rise back up? There is a midrash that says that we should imagine God as a king sitting on a throne when we bow at any part of the service. You bend your body over in respect, and you bring your face back up on the word Adonai. Why? Because God (the king) doesn't want to see the back of your head when you are saying God's name. You may wonder whether it makes a difference to offer a small bow or a big one. I believe that it does. This is a moment in our service when we are acknowledging the sacred in our lives, offering up ourselves to whatever is holy to us, bigger than us. It feels different, and it means something different, to really, truly give yourself over in that moment, to resist the hesitation, the self-consciousness, and to offer yourself completely instead.

Next time you are in shul, remember that the bowing is not just for God. It is also for us. It is a reminder that we are part of something so much bigger than ourselves. It does not matter what kind of God you believe in, or if you believe in God at all. What matters is that at the moments when the liturgy asks us to combine our voices, our text and our bodies in a moment of offering, you are brave enough to surrender to it. You might be surprised by how much you get in return.

Another project that CBT has supported for many years is the work of the J.F. **Kapnek Trust**. The Trust operates the largest pediatric HIV/AIDS transmission prevention program in Zimbabwe, and it has been incredibly effective. The leaders of the Trust announced recently that, thanks to a large grant from a big European nonprofit, they should be able to reduce the mother-to-child HIV transmission rate to U.S. levels within the next five years. The Trust also supports thousands of orphaned, vulnerable, or disabled children through 68 preschools, and it depends on small, individual contributions to keep those schools going. CBT congregants have donated many boxes of preschool supplies over the last decade. I didn't manage to organize a collection last winter, but I'm looking forward to doing so this year. Look for the flyers in the lobby and elsewhere in Tikvah Talk for more information.

Finally, before we know it, the **Counting-the-Omer food drive** will be underway, so our lobby should be brimming with boxes and barrels of good will this winter and spring. As always, I welcome questions, comments, and suggestions for Social Action projects or anything else that you feel would enrich your synagogue experience.
