At the end of the Book of Genesis the survival of Jacob's family depended on Joseph's ability in Egypt to envision 7 good years followed by 7 bad years, according to the Pharoah's dreams, and then the Pharoah's disposition to give the green light to bring the whole Israelite clan to Egypt. Later Pharoahs would not be so favorable, but at a time of ecological crisis Joseph's foresight and Egyptian graciousness were critical.

Last month, under the auspices of the Jewish environmental group "Hazon" (Vision), I met with the head of Israel's Green party, Alon Tal. He explained how far Israel had drifted from one aspect of the Zionist Dream, to be in tune

with the Land. So many farms and industries have been privatized that, although the economy is quite strong, the soil and the environment have suffered.

On the positive side, the population in general considers its land so precious that Green awareness is not just considered a liberal concern. Israel is very advanced in its quest for renewable energy and, Tal explained, many Israelis across the political spectrum would like to see Israel be the first carbon neutral country. Many along the Mediterranean coast from Ashdod to Tel Aviv warn against the "Losangelezatzia" of their homeland becoming an urban sprawl.

Environmental issues are complicated by politics, population growth, and a fragile climate. Clean air and resolution of water rights

At the time of my article, we were informed that Cantor Chabon delivered a healthy son on January 20th. Jennie and Steve - on behalf of our temple, we wish your son a life of love, excitement and laughter!

For those of you that were part of our shtetl before 2003, I'm sure you can remember the old trailers in the corner of the parking lot that were packed if we had more than 12 children in either K or 1st grade, half the classrooms downstairs which had no windows, the social hall (now our teen lounge) which was bursting at the seams if more than 120 people were standing for a Kiddush or 60 were seated, the Gift Shop that you could not 'walk' into, the library which few knew existed, the sanctuary when it faced west instead of east, the Temple office which was

large enough for 1 desk but had 2, and the pitch in the roofline in Rabbi Asher's office where everyone had to watch their heads – especially the Rabbi! The building was less than half the size it is now.

At that time, we as a community decided to embark on a bold journey to renovate our temple to last for generations. The results are irrefutable:

- Incredible social hall where families have celebrated Bar / Bat Mitzvah parties and weddings, Purim Festivals, end of the school year party, countless speakers, Winter Nights, numerous fundraisers. Plus an extremely well designed efficient kitchen.
- Modern classrooms, teen lounge, library and religious school administration offices that provide our teachers and madrichim the resources to properly educate our students in a warm (figuratively and literally) environment.
- Spacious and welcoming offices for the Rabbi and Cantor when they meet with nervous parents/children right before a bar/bat mitzvah, grieving families upon the loss of a loved one, or uncertain prospective members.
- A beautiful and warm sanctuary which resonates the lovely sounds of Cantor Chabon as well as the tropes of our B'nai Mitzvot or the thought-provoking sermons from the Rabbi.

This, what I'll call a "masterpiece," came at a price; specifically, \$4.375 million. Prior to embarking on the renovation, we met with many of our members to secure either direct contributions or future pledges. On behalf of the community, I want to thank those

What am I? Hopefully you answered the Jewish holiday of Purim. If so, you won a lifetime supply of Hamentaschen from Costco. What significance does this holiday hold on the Jewish calendar? Purim is one of the most

joyous and fun holidays as it commemorates a time when the Jewish people living in Persia were saved from extermination. But why all the revelry and hoopla? Because we are commanded to "eat, drink, and be merry". We are commanded to boo and hiss and attempt to blot out the name of Haman at his very mention during the public reading of the Scroll of Esther. And according to the Talmud, we are required to drink until we cannot tell the difference between "cursed be Haman" and "blessed be Mordecai" (though opinions differ as to exactly how drunk that is). When else can you come to Temple drunk and be loud and obnoxious and dress up in costume? I love this holiday because of its irreverent nature. The High Holidays are solemn and reflective, Passover has its dietary restrictions, and Sukkot makes us eat and sleep outside for a week. But on Adar 14 we party in the streets like its Mardi Gras.

For all the joy on this holiday, Jewish custom tells us that we cannot fully enjoy the day without remembering those less fortunate that ourselves. Therefore, we are commanded to send out gifts of food or drink, and to make gifts to charity. The sending of gifts of food and drink is referred to as *Mishloach Manot* (lit. sending out portions). It is always the balance that we Jews keep in order to make the world a better place.

Finally, it is also customary to hold carnival-like celebrations on Purim, to perform plays and parodies, and to hold beauty contests. To this end, Congregation B'nai Tikvah will be holding Purim festivities, beginning on Sunday, March 4 with our Annual Purim Carnival, followed by the annual Purim Spiel and Megillah Reading on Wednesday evening, March 7. On this page you'll find a tear-out order form to by tickets for the Purim Carnival in order to beat the rush. Hopefully you will all join us on that joyous day, ready to "eat, drink, and be merry," and to dress up as your favorite Purim character.

Chag Purim Samech!!

We're having a <u>PURIM BASH SUNDAY, MARCH 4</u>!!

"And so, on the thirteenth day of the 12^{th} month – that is, the month of Adar – when the king's command and decree were to be executed, the very day on which the enemies of the Jews had expected to get them in their power, the opposite happened, and the Jews got their enemies in their power. (Esther 9:1)...[The Jews] disposed of their enemies...That was on the 13^{th} day of the month of Adar; and they rested on the 14^{th} day and made it a day of feasting and merrymaking (Esther 9:16-17)."

So, in short, the Jews rose up, defeated Haman, his sons, and the others who were out to hurt them, and rejoiced afterward. What a lovely underdog story and Hollywood plot line. And how do we commemorate the "day of feasting and merrymaking"? We party, of course!! If you have ever been to Israel on Purim, you would swear you were in New Orleans for Mardi Gras (without the beads). There is partying in the streets so that we will forever blot out the memory of Haman (*BOOO*!!!!).

This year, CBT will help create a party atmosphere by throwing a Purim Festival, a **B'nai Tikvah Bash** of sorts. We will sing, dance, eat, be entertained, and play games until we cannot take any more. Everyone is encouraged to come in costume Sunday March 4. Regular Religious School hours will be in effect while we create an entire Purim atmosphere – **Carnival, food, and a brief Purim Spiel written and performed by our teenage Madrichim.** Everything begins at 9:30am that morning. We will begin with an all-school assembly, followed by the Purim Spiel, singing, costume contest, and then we will adjourn to enjoy the rest of the festivities: carnival games, food (Hot Dog lunch, chips, refreshments, Hamantaschen), and prizes. **Each Religious School student will receive 25 tickets.** All games and food will require between 2-8 tickets. You have the ability to pre-purchase additional tickets at a special discount rate. Fill out order form on the next page which must be returned by Thursday, March 1.

AFTER-SCHOOL ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

CBT's Religious School has begun offering an after-school Hebrew enrichment program, entitled Hebrew "Boot Camp." The details of the program are as follows:



- 1. Class is held from 12:15pm-1:15pm.
- 2. Each "set" of classes is held in 5-week blocks.
- 3. Current CBT Religious School teachers are teaching.

4 ..Classes are "leveled" - regardless of which grade your child is in, students will be placed together by Hebrew ability.

5. Cost of each 5-week session is \$90.

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families for their generosity as we have collected \$4 million. However, we currently owe the bank \$1.3 million and several temple members \$600,000 (as a 2nd mortgage). The pledges which started back in 2001 are evaporating and we need to begin the process of reaching out to you about the next round of contributions. These pledges are the primary source to pay the two above mortgage payments. Sometimes there is a misnomer that your annual Membership contributions help to cover our mortgage payment. They do not. They cover everything else: salaries, ritual expenses, utilities, normal maintenance, etc. The building maintenance fund (your annual \$275 donation) is set up to cover major repairs (i.e. new air conditioning/heating unit, roof, parking lot re-pavement, etc.).

In the next couple of months, the Board of Trustees and Finance Committee will be addressing these challenges and determining a plan of action on how to best approach this critically important issue. My next few Tikvah Talk articles will focus on our progress.

Our two board member profiled this month are Glenn Gould and Jen Paul.

Glenn, his wife, Marci and their two children, Avery and Peri have been members of CBT for 7 ½ years. Since joining, Glenn has been involved in a myriad of roles and responsibilities. During his tenure, Glenn was the chairperson of our social action committee (which involved several events such as Winter Nights, Relay for Life, and school supplies for Zimbabwe.)
