spectrum of personalities. If some kids are branded as "unusual" the Bar and Bat Mitzvah is a clear declaration that all are worthy and all are privileged to carry the Torah and find his or her own insights.

Gay children, Gothic teens, and self-proclaimed "nerds" have gone through our system and onto Midrasha with the sense that the synagogue community has no tolerance for intolerances, on the contrary, we have a deep respect for independent thinking. I hope that the sensitivity of our teachers and parents has created a safe place for all; but "Bully" has reminded me that vigilance is required, that there's no resting on our laurels, and that the consequences of any indifference can be tragic.
