## Reflections...

It has been several months since our beautiful high holiday services when we gathered (in historic numbers!) at St Matthew to pray and sing and connect. Those holidays made me believe in what we are building here at CBT more than

ever before, and my faith in our community has only deepened and grown since then. What we have at CBT is very special: a creative, compassionate, deeply Torahinfused and musically-inspired community of kind and loving people, people who are committed to justice and real conversation, and to the cultivation of transformational Judaism that speaks to all kinds of seekers. We are offering something unique, and people are responding to it because we are growing! Our numbers are growing, our ruach is soaring and our programs are succeeding, one after another. I am so proud of who we are now and who we are becoming.

There are lots of reasons for our success, lots of people and ideas that create the magic that is CBT. But high on my list of reasons as 2019 comes to a close is that we are a community of people that is willing to engage in true dialogue--whether about God or faith or what it means to be Jewish--in respectful and loving ways. Since becoming the rabbi on July 1st, I have had many meaningful conversations with people in our community with whom I agree, and with whom I passionately disagree. Every one of those conversations has resulted in my learning something important about myself and about our synagogue. I do not take those conversations for granted, and I value each and every one of them.

The earliest chapters of the Torah are filled with examples of why honest communication is so critical to healthy relationships. Adam and Eve are kicked out of the Garden of Eden for failing to take responsibility for their actions, blaming each other rather than being honest about the decisions they made; Cain is severely punished not just for killing his brother, but perhaps even more so, for denying his role in the violence; and the entire inherited cycle of deception begins with

As I looked around the room, people were enjoying the amazing food, enjoying each other's company and enjoying the beauty of Shabbat. Everyone felt welcomed. In all of my years at CBT, I have never seen an event like this. We are so fortunate that the CCJCC helped sponsor this event! Keep your eyes peeled as there will be one more FEAST event this year. ## New Opportunities to Help Refugee Families and Asylum Seekers

"When a stranger resides with you in your land, you shall not wrong him. The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as one of your citizens; you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." (Leviticus 19:33-34)

No fewer than 36 times, more often than any other commandment, does Tanakh tell us to welcome and care for the stranger. According to the UN High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR), there are currently 70.8 million forcibly displaced persons worldwide, 25.9 million of whom are refugees and 3.5 million who are asylum seekers. These are people driven from their homes by wars, political and gang violence, social persecution, famine, and economic collapse. The problems of the world's migrants seem overwhelming, yet as Jews we are compelled to act.

For several years, the Social Action Committee at CBT has been engaged in refugee resettlement efforts and helping asylum seekers acclimate to life in the Bay Area. But the numbers of people needing assistance continues to grow. We are looking for new volunteers to support our efforts. There are three programs that we are currently engaged with that need more volunteers.

Join a Newcomer Support Team for Refugees. We

are working with Jewish Family and Community Services (JFCS) to support refugee families, many of whom were translators for U.S. troops in Afghanistan. We are forming Newcomer Support Teams of 4-6 congregants working together to support a family. We will take family members to appointments, help with English language skills, take family members shopping, help the family learn to use transit, help kids with homework, and generally help the family adjust to life in a new country. The commitment is for 4 to 6 months, and individuals who sign up could expect a commitment of up to 4 hours per week for the first couple of months with the need for help becoming more occasional after

that. Training will be provided.

Join an Accompaniment Team to support an asylum seeker. The asylum seekers are children or adults who are escaping violence in their home country but do not yet have legal status. The accompaniment team would be a group of at least 5 people and the commitment would be for 6 month to a year. The time commitment is expected to be about an hour per week. Spanish language skills are helpful but not necessary. Support needs include: help finding work; help with family reunification issues; help accessing health care services; getting to legal/court appointments, and other needs similar to the refugee support teams. Training will be provided.

Participate in "Accompaniment for a Day" efforts. If you are unable to make a 4-6 month commitment, there are often needs for people to accompany refugees and asylum seekers to court appointments, medical appointments, hire an immigrant for a short-term work assignment, or other one-time volunteer activities.

Individual Volunteer Support. You don't need to be part of a team to help. JFCS can place you with a family member to: tutor, drive to appts, be a friend. Help is needed on weekday, daytime hours.

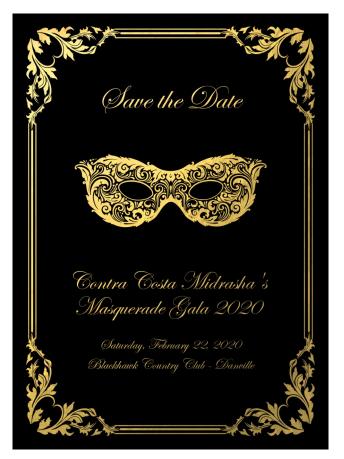
