Reflections...

Friends,

Several years ago, when the choir was rehearsing in the sanctuary at St Matthew before Rosh Hashanah, their sound technician Tom Aragon overheard a conversation between me and a congregant. We were talking

about how this congregant's wife doesn't believe in God. Tom, a devout Christian, responded by saying, "Oh, I didn't know that she isn't Jewish!" No, I told him. She's Jewish. She just doesn't believe in God. Tom was baffled. Truly confused. He wanted to know how you could identify as Jewish without believing in God. And right there, in his sanctuary, the difference between Christianity and Judaism was laid bare. It went against Tom's entire understanding of faith to imagine belonging to a synagogue, or identifying as Jewish, without God as part of the equation. For him, faith is what makes you a Christian. For us, action and wrestling with the big questions are what make you Jewish. And matzah ball soup and Jewish music and many other ritual and cultural traditions of course. But all of those can be experienced in rich and varied ways without God. I personally believe deeply in God and cannot imagine leading prayer or being a rabbi or cantor without that faith. But I know far too many devoted, atheist lews to think that God has to be a part of the experience for everyone.

I have taught many classes in my 16 years at CBT, almost all of which have centered around prayer and liturgy and music, which are the areas of our tradition that inspire me most. Our liturgy is magnificent, and I never tire of it. But recently, I have fallen back in love with the Torah. I have always loved studying Torah, and chanting Torah, and opening the ark to reveal those gorgeous scrolls. In recent years, the Torah has come even more alive for me in a new and exalted way, and we have devoted our Tuesday Lunch and Learn classes to taking a deep dive into those beautiful and complex stories like never before. A teacher of mine in rabbinical school once told me that to be a great rabbi, you must know the Torah like no other book. I have taken that advice and dedicated myself to Torah study wholeheartedly.

Out of that study has come a desire to explore the ethical teachings that are born of the mitzvot, the questions and dilemmas that have been the source of rabbinic debate for

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Today is one of those days that is neither cloudy nor sunny, unseasonably warm nor terribly cold. It is damp, but not really wet. The days are getting longer, certainly, but still, darkness envelopes our day at such an early hour. Today is a day that is "sitting in between." Between winter

and the early spring that we know so well living in California. Stepping outside I feel the sponginess of the earth underneath my shoes. I know that in a few more weeks, all will be abloom. And I will think, "Wait! This is too soon. I am not ready. We need more time for winter. More time for the magic that happens underground in the quiet darkness." Alas. This cold and dark time of the year can lend itself so beautifully to quiet contemplation and ways to try to connect with ourselves. For me, I know that with all of the white noise of my mind, and the endless ways to distract myself, it is so very easy to lose connection to myself. When that happens, I feel adrift, unmoored, floating untethered. I need to find ways to settle myself and touch what is deep and true. When this happens, I know that I can reach out to any of our shared lewish rituals and find a way to ground myself. There have been countless times that I have come to Shabbat services, crabby from a difficult week, and I will think to myself "NOTHING can change THIS mood. Not the music. Not the prayers. Not the people. Not the sermon." And then, about a third of the way through the service, I find the weight of the week is not quite so heavy. And by the end I am leaping out of my seat for the final song. I am socializing happily at the Oneg. On a recent Shabbat, Rabbi Chabon spoke of Shabbat as medicine. And for me, those words are apt. For a brief, yet precious time, I can connect back to myself. I am grateful every single time. It is amazing. I can go back out into the world refreshed, and maybe share a bit of the lightness that was sparked in my own heart.

But aside from connection to our own internal landscapes, it is our obligation as Jews to find ways to connect with the big, wide world around us. The most amazing connections are happening right here, with everything that we offer at CBT. Last summer, the Midrasha Mifgash program came to us through the vision of Cathie Izen (of the Israel and World Jewry Committee), our congregant who knows the power that

millennia. Take a leap of faith

Years ago I found myself in a situation where my seder plans fell through last minute, and my family had nowhere to go to celebrate the first night of Passover. I was feeling so alone, having just moved to a new state, and not knowing enough people to invite to

celebrate with us. A friend of a friend, Rose Cohen, a woman whom I had never met or talked to before, heard that my family was alone for the holiday and invited us to her seder. At first, I wanted to decline this very generous invitation - I didn't want to go celebrate in what felt to me at the time as a 'pity invitation' with a group of people I didn't know. It took my mother threatening me that if I didn't go she would not agree to hear me complain about not having friends in California, for me to take this leap of faith, get out of my comfort zone and attend one of the most special seders of my life. And yes, I do on occasion listen to my mom, especially when my right to complain is in jeopardy. It is through this one magnificent evening of a complete stranger opening her heart and her home to me that I found all of my closest friends, and for that, I am forever thankful to Rose.

This year on February 28th, we are going to celebrate our 3rd annual Shabbat on the Block. Two years ago when this program was first introduced, 156 of us took a leap of faith and participated in this evening, trusting that celebrating Shabbat with our CBT neighbors is going to enrich our lives. The following year 236 of us gathered in sixteen houses stretching from Benicia to Oakland and everywhere in between to celebrate a magical Shabbat together. Many of us walked away from this experience with new friends, new familiar faces at the temple, and a warm feeling of community and home.

If you are new to the community, or if you haven't given Shabbat on the Block a chance, I hope that this year you will take a leap of faith and join a local group in celebrating Shabbat. For some of us, it is not a problem to join a group of strangers and get to know them. But for many of us, including myself, that can be an intimidating endeavor. If you fall into this category, I urge you for one evening to step out of your comfort zone, just like I did, and give this evening a chance. You never know, your closest friends might just be in this house to celebrate Shabbat with you. I promise you that on my end, I will put a lot of thought into making each house harmonious and for people to enjoy spending time together. And if you are still on the fence, perhaps you should talk to my mother.
