REFLECTIONS...

Dear friends, As you all know, our Israel trip in March was canceled because of the war, but I have continued to communicate with the rabbi who runs the tour company we were working with. He is a Reform rabbi who made aliyah ten years ago and now lives in Tel Aviv. Every time we speak, I feel a sense of connection with him and

I am always grateful to hear from him.

In our last exchange, I asked him to give me a sense of how people are feeling in Israel right now. I feel so helpless, and so far from Israel, so it feels important to at least find out how Israelis are doing and feeling during this ongoing tragedy.

This is what he shared:

1. People want Bibi out. That's clear.

2. The government they say they want will be center/right but more trustworthy.

3. People are quite torn on what goal is most important – destroying Hamas or getting the hostages home. It's clear that we can't do both – at least not simultaneously. This is where I see the most angst.

"This is where I see the most angst." Those are the words that keep echoing in my head because they give me a sense of the internal struggle that Israelis are holding. Their angst is what makes me want to keep reaching out, to keep praying, so that our family across the world knows that we are in fact a global Jewish community.

It is striking to me, as I think about the interconnectedness of the Jewish community, that we are all yearning to be seen, to be witnessed in the fullness of our human experience, whether by friends here at CBT or by people thousands of miles away. We are all looking to cultivate what Rabbi Sharon Brous calls "the amen effect." In her wonderful new book by the same title, Rabbi Brous suggests that the magic of Jewish community depends on each person being willing to say 'amen' to others in their community, whether that amen is a blessing at a joyful time or an amen when someone is suffering. No matter what you are going through, your Jewish community, whether local or global, should be able to show up and say 'amen' to your experience and help you through it. We all need someone to see our angst and to hold it with us.

The trick, and the hardest part, is that this requires honesty and commitment on both sides. When you need help, you must ask for it. And when you are the one being asked, you must feel that it is your holy responsibility as a community member to say yes and to show up for people who cannot do it alone.

For this reason, I would like to invite you all to consider joining

EDUCATION

Notice. Appreciate. Wonder. It's my favorite thinking tool. It's a reflection practice that invites you to look at a piece of work, which could be a piece of art, a learning project, a story, and first, pay attention. What do you see, hear, experience? Then, comment, if you

wish, on what you appreciate about it. Finally, wonder. What questions arise for you? About the work? About the creator of the work? About the subject of the work? Where does this work take your thoughts and feelings? How does this make you wonder? What does it make you wonder about?

Three of our teachers (K'tan Tan, K/1, and 2nd grade) participated in a day-long training this fall on Torah Godly <u>Play</u>. It's a storytelling strategy using simple 3-D materials and short pieces of Torah to engage young children (though you could be any age really) in Torah study. Using a minimalistic set of tools, a simplified text, and some hand gestures, the experience is astonishingly mesmerizing, creating a kind of contemplative approach to Torah that draws you in deeply. The most important part of the practice is the wondering questions that follow: I wonder what part of the story you like best? I wonder what part of the story you think is the most important? I wonder where you are in the story? I wonder if there's any part of this story we could take out and still have all the story we need? These wondering questions take the story to the next level, inviting listeners into a relationship with the text and into curiosity about what a text is and what else it could be.

Today in our 4th grade classroom I was able to hear students wondering what God looks like and wondering how we can express our love for God, as the V'ahavta prayer commands us. And how could we be commanded to love at all? How is that even a thing? Especially this God that we can't see or experience with our senses?

In 3rd grade, we wondered how sitting still and listening could be prayer. And if it is prayer, what are we listening for? And if we are listening for God, what does God sound like? And before we wondered, we noticed. What do we hear when we sit still outside in the amphitheater for a minute? For three? I can tell you from experience that if we sit still for three minutes, we hear a lot of restless 3rd-grade bodies, but they wanted to try it.

So what is it about wondering and curiosity that matters to education? Obviously, we need to be curious to learn. But more than that, we have to cultivate curiosity to create learners. If we delude ourselves into thinking there are just a handful of things to know and learning is only about the acquisition of that information, then we've left out all the joy of learning, including discovery and experimentation and *(Continued on page 3)*

President's Message

As we continue to navigate the ever-changing landscape of our lives and world today, I am reminded of the profound strength and resilience that our synagogue community embodies. Jews need each other now, more than ever. It is crucial for us to come together, support one another, and deepen the bonds that unite us as a spiritual family.

Recently, Rabbi Chabon invited our community to read the book, "The Amen Effect" by Rabbi Sharon Brous. I strongly encourage you to read this book. I believe exploring the author's perspectives can provide everyone with invaluable insights and tools to enhance our community experience. "The Amen Effect" delves into the power of two "rules" - showing up in community and truly seeing each other when we do.

You show up for the wedding and the funeral. You show up for the simchas and the bad times. Jews are a people of community. Rabbi Brous invites us to reflect on the significance of our shared rituals, prayers, and moments of support during the good and the bad. In doing so, we combat the isolation and loneliness that threaten our individual and community health. The Amen Effect allowed the book group to explore how our words and actions not only shape our individual lives but also the fabric of our community life. We have an opportunity to deepen our understanding of one another, cultivate empathy, and create a space where every voice is heard and valued.

In light of this, I am writing to emphasize the importance of actively connecting with one another through the simple yet profound acts of listening, showing up, and getting involved in our community's life and activities.

Whether you show up for religious school, Shabbat services, a program, or stop by the office – I encourage you to say hello or just smile at someone you don't know. Take the time to get to know members of our community. It is a gift to truly hear one another's stories, experiences, joys, and struggles.

In this moment, we not only honor each other's humanity but also foster a culture of empathy, understanding, and mutual respect within our community. Let us commit to showing up, being attentive listeners, and truly seeing each other's joys and pains.

Another theme in "The Amen Effect" is *b'tzelem Elohim*. Every person is created in the image of God. Each person carries in them the essence of God. When we look for and see this in every person we meet, our eyes are opened and we actually see each other. Think of the way it felt the last time someone took the time to really see you.

It feels amazing, right? Now imagine that every time you are at CBT, someone sees you like that. Are you smiling like I am?

We want CBT to be a place for each of us to show up and see each other. One little way to meet this goal is to greet and see each person who shows up for services or a program. When members of our community say "Hi! Welcome! Glad you are here." to each person who enters our synagogue, we see and value them, and make sure they know we are glad they are here. imagining new unanswered questions and new unimagined ideas. To create possibility we need curiosity.

At CBT religious school we're trying to go one more step, to cultivate not just wondering minds but a sense of wonder, a kind of awe, and an openness to possibility. Part of that is endemic to Judaism. We are questioners at the core, evolvers of our tradition and practice, wanderers (albeit not usually willingly) who get curious about where we are and find ways to adapt. But at a deeper level tapping into our capacity for awe and wonder creates opportunities for joy and hope and what Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel called "radical amazement." To bring that into the world as Jews, we have to practice it, play with it, discover it, be in it. Not in the answers but in the wondering, and in the wonder. I wonder how that could change the world.
